## LA Strikes Back Assembles to Fight for a City That Works for the People

**LOS ANGELES, CA** — Beneath the packed freeways and the glamour of Hollywood, it is the people of Los Angeles who keep the city moving. The food, music, labor, and cultural heartbeat of the city run through neighborhoods across LA. Yet for many residents, the question remains: *Why isn't the city working for the people who make it work?*

Angelenos across the region are grappling with rising costs of living, intensified immigration enforcement that is tearing families apart, and escalating federal attacks on fundamental freedoms. At a time when many feel overwhelmed, squeezed, and uncertain about what they can do, community leaders are calling people together to learn, connect, and take action.

“Los Angeles should be safe, affordable, and work for the people who live and work here—not just the wealthy or powerful,” said Patricia Guerra, Vice President for Community Coalition’s Center for Community Organizing. “This moment calls for Angelenos to come together, understand what’s at stake, and stand up for the city we all deserve.”

Community organizations, advocates, and residents will gather for a region-wide community assembly focused on equipping Angelenos with the information, resources, and the collective power needed to respond to the challenges facing their communities.
